FEBRUARY 5 - MEMORIAL OF SAINT AGATHA, VIRGIN, MARTYR: It is alleged that Agatha was sent to a brothel to force her to give up her faith. After she was tortured, the Apostle Peter is supposed to have appeared and cured her. Her intervention was credited with stilling the eruption of Mount Etna the year after her burial. She died during the time of the Decian persecution (249-251) and is considered a patron of miners, alpine guides, and nurses.

FEBRUARY 6 - MEMORIAL OF SAINT PAUL MIKI AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS: Paul Miki joined the Jesuits in 1580. On February 6, 1597, he and 25 companions – clergy and lay – died for their faith in Nagasaki, Japan. They were suspended on crosses and killed with spears thrust through the heart. Their persecution was triggered by a nationalist fear of foreigners; for almost the next 200 years, Japan would be closed to the rest of the world. Despite this isolation, the faith survived without any priests and with only the Sacrament of Baptism. Paul Miki and his companions were canonized in 1862.

<u>February 8 - Memorial of St. Jerome Emiliani, Priest:</u> Born in Venice in 1486, Jerome at first gave very little thought to God. However, after a conversion experience, he gave all his possessions to the poor, became a priest, and devoted himself to the instruction of orphans and the care of the poor. Jerome was also the founder of the Somascan Fathers and Brothers. He died in 1537 and is a patron of orphans and abandoned children.

<u>February 8 - Memorial of St. Josephine Bakhita, Virgin:</u> Born in Africa in 1869, Josephine was kidnapped at age 9 by slave traders who called her "Bakhita". She was eventually sold to the Italian Consul who treated her with kindness and warmth. She accompanied him and his family to Italy and went to live with the Canossian Sister in Venice.

FEBRUARY 10 - MEMORIAL OF SAINT SCHOLASTICA, VIRGIN: Scholastica was the twin sister of Saint Benedict, the founder of Western monasticism, and she was the leader of a women's community. She is the patroness of nuns, especially Benedictines, and of convulsive children. Scholastica died about 543 and was buried in Benedict=s own tomb where he joined her in death soon after





5[™] SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In today's Gospel, we see Jesus, after healing "many who were sick with various diseases" and casting out "many demons", rising early in the morning and going out to a deserted place to pray. When his disciples find him and tell him that everyone is searching for him, Jesus says, "Let us go on to the neighbouring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also, for that is what I came out to do". Prayer, being in communion with God, was crucial to Jesus' ministry. It gave him strength and enabled him to keep his focus on his mission to preach the good news of salvation. The lesson for us, as Jesus' disciples, is to maintain a balance in our lives. Just as work is balanced by rest and relaxation, so too our ministry involvement must be balanced by prayer. Praying, being in communion with God, will give us the strength we need to continue our service to others and to make the mission of the Lord Jesus truly our own.

Message from Bishop Daniels

Just before Christmas, the Government of Canada changed its requirements regarding applications for federal funding under its Canada Summer Jobs program. What must now be included is that "both the job and the organization's core mandate respect individual human rights in Canada, including the values underlying the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms as well as other rights. These include reproductive rights which the government specifies includes "the right to access safe and legal abortions"

As a consequence we cannot apply for federal funding for summer employment for students which is our right as Canadians. We are asking every person of faith within the diocese to contact their Federal Member of Parliament to express concern about depriving Roman Catholics of our right as Canadians unless we betray our religious values.

All through the closing hymn, they will be able to play their instruments while walking down through the church. When they reach the back of the Church, they can leave their instruments on the table. Cremation in the Catholic Church: Many people are inquiring about cremation in the Church, and some people are choosing to have their body cremated after death. The first thing all must know is that cremation is permitted in the Catholic Church. Some large cities are finding difficulty in obtaining large pieces of ground for new cemeteries and cremation may be a partial solution to this problem. Also, some people die far from home, and the cost of sending home the body in a casket is very expensive compared to sending an urn with a loved ones ashes. Cremation should take place after the funeral Mass. The ashes of the deceased person should be reverently buried or entombed in a place reserved for the burial of the dead. As in life, the body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, so in death the ashes of the deceased person should be buried in a holy place where we await the resurrection to new life.

But we may have become too rigid, too self-righteous, too stuck in our own ways to even try to understand the point of view of another person. We see things like injustice, bigotry, racism, greed, violence, murder and war, but we may be part of the problem ourselves. Like the man said "*Nobody is shot by a gun that wasn't shot before with a word.*"
