NOVEMBER 9 - FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN

BASILICA: Originally known as the Archbasilica of the Most Holy Saviour, this Church is called Saint John Lateran because it was built on property owned by the Laterani family and given to the Church and because it was served by monks from the monastery of Saint John the Baptist and Saint John the Divine. The Church is the cathedra (chair) of the Bishop of Rome, presently Pope Francis. In a sense, because it is the Pope's Church, the Lateran Basilica is the spiritual home of all Catholics. On an ancient plaque at the entrance, there is a Latin inscription which translates as 'The Most Holy Church of the Lateran, the Mother and Head of all Churches of the City and the World', and so the whole Church rejoices in its dedication.

NOVEMBER 10 - MEMORIAL OF SAINT LEO THE GREAT, POPE,

DOCTOR: Leo was Pope from 440 until his death in 461. He is wellknown for his peacekeeping efforts, in particular for his encounter with Attila the Hun when he persuaded Attila not to plunder Rome. Later, during another attack, he managed to save the city from being burnt and subsequently worked alongside the people to rebuild the city and its Churches. He is the first Pope whose sermons and letters have been preserved in extensive collections, and his teaching has had a lasting influence on the life of the Roman Church. Saint Leo the Great was made a Doctor of the Church in 1754.

NOVEMBER 11 - REMEMBRANCE DAY: Today Canadians pause in silence to remember those who died in war and to pray for the victims of aggression and inhumanity throughout the world. This is a day also to pray for peace, to consider what we are doing as individuals, as a community, and as a nation to bring God's peace into the world. It is a day too for a believing community to rededicate itself by prayer and action to the ideals Jesus gives us in the Beatitudes (*Matthew 5.1-12*).

NOVEMBER 11 - MEMORIAL OF SAINT MARTIN OF TOURS,

BISHOP: Martin, born to pagan parents, became a Christian catechumen and was baptized at 18 years of age. Later he pursued his vocation as a monk. He was joined by disciples and together they founded the first monastery in Gaul (France). In 371 he was proclaimed Bishop of Tours by the people. He served as a bishop-monk and converted pagans to the faith until his death in 397. He is usually depicted on horseback, offering his cloak to a poor man. Martin is a patron of France, soldiers, and vintners.

THIRTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In today's Gospel, Jesus highlights two points in his teaching. First, drawing on the example of the scribes who "like to walk around in long robes, and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces", Jesus clearly cautions his own disciples, and us too, against the dangers of hypocrisy – of manifesting external piety without truly surrendering our hearts to God. Then Jesus points to the poor widow who, with her contribution of "two small copper coins" to the treasury, "put in everything she had, all she had to live on". Jesus upholds the poor widow's offering, commending her because her small offering was an act of profound generosity, given from her livelihood rather than her surplus. To give from one's livelihood is not only an act of generosity but also an act of total dependence on God. Today we are called to give more generously of our time, our talent, and our treasury, following the poor widow's example of 'sacrificial giving' and following Jesus' ultimate act of generosity and trust in God, giving his life for us on the Cross.
