LITURGICAL YEAR 2017-2018: As we journey through November, we gradually draw near to the end of the current Liturgical Year as we celebrate the last four Sundays of Ordinary Time, the last Sunday being *The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.* Ordinary time celebrates the mystery of Christ in all its fullness. *In these last Sundays of the Liturgical Year, our focus turns to the return of Christ and the fulfillment of the Kingdom.*

<u>November 15 - Memorial of Saint Albert the Great, Bishop, Doctor:</u> . He is a patron saint of scientists.

November 16 - Memorial of Saint Margaret of Scotland: Margaret married Malcolm Canmore, King of Scotland, in 1070. To her husband and his country she brought the best of European culture and encouraged many by her life of Christian virtue. She worked for justice and improved conditions for the poor; she also guided the Celtic Church toward strong ties with Rome, rebuilt Churches, and brought the Benedictines to Scotland. She gave birth to eight children, was a model of motherhood, and is one of the few canonized saints to have reared a large family. She was canonized in 1251 and was named a patron saint of Scotland in 1673.

November 16 - Memorial of Saint Gertrude, Virgin: Gertrude (2156-1301) was a promising scholar of the humanities and eventually became a Benedictine nun. When she was nearly 25, she received the first of many visions. Her visions and spiritual instructions comprise five books, the second of these books being her own composition. This book alone shows the depth of her spiritual and intellectual gifts for which she was renowned. Though she was never officially canonized, her feast is in the general calendar of the Roman rite.

NOVEMBER 17 - MEMORIAL OF SAINT ELIZABETH OF HUNGARY, RELIGIOUS:

Elizabeth was a married woman, but after her husband's death she made provision for her children and entered the Third Order of Saint Francis, spending her days caring for the sick, the aged, and the poor. Renowned for her prayer, her works of charity, her spirit of penance, and her great gentleness, she died in 1231 and was canonized in 1235. She is a patron saint of the Franciscan Third Order and of Catholic charities.

32™ SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In today's Gospel, Jesus highlights two points in his teaching. First, drawing on the example of the scribes who "like to walk around in long robes, and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces", Jesus clearly cautions his own disciples, and us too, against the dangers of hypocrisy – of manifesting external piety without truly surrendering our hearts to God. Then Jesus points to the poor widow who, with her contribution of "two small copper coins" to the treasury, "put in everything she had, all she had to live on". Jesus upholds the poor widow's offering, commending her because her small offering was an act of profound generosity, given from her livelihood rather than her surplus. To give from one's livelihood is not only an act of generosity but also an act of total dependence on God. Today we are called to give more generously of our time, our talent, and our treasury, following the poor widow's example of 'sacrificial giving' and following Jesus' ultimate act of generosity and trust in God, giving his life for us on the Cross.
